

# Fallen Man, Just God, Wonderful Savior

Numbers 16  
August 9, 2009

In Numbers 16, we have lessons, principles and comparisons, from three days in the wilderness. Compare mankind, you and me, our just and righteous God in heaven, and Jesus Christ as our wonderful savior. Follow three players through this passage: the rebels, God, and the Priests, Moses and Aaron.

1. A. Do people in the Bible remind you of yourself? The Bible brings characters to life when we look at how they acted or conducted themselves. Think about this as you proceed through this study and read this passage. Begin by looking at the rebels.  
Numbers 16:1-3

- B. Who were these rebellious men?  
Numbers 3:25-32, 4:1-4

What is Korah's charge against Moses and Aaron? Is it justified?  
Numbers 16:1-3

- C. What principles can you draw from this study so far?

2. A. How does Moses respond? Who appointed Moses to this position in the first place? Are there principles you can draw from this?  
Number 16:4-11, Exodus 3:10-12

- B. Note that Korah's rebellion is contagious. How like us is this?  
Numbers 16:12-14

C. Read on as the showdown takes place.  
Number 16:15-19

3. A. How does God respond at the showdown? What do Moses and Aaron do again?  
Number 16:20-22

B. How does God plan to deal with this sin of rebellion?  
Numbers 16:23-30

What happens? What is the principle here?  
Numbers 16:31-35

C. How does God make it clear He wants this event to be remembered?  
Numbers 16:36-40, I Corinthians 10:6

4. A. Read on, Numbers 16:41. How is this the most shocking verse of Numbers 16?

B. Read this entire last paragraph, Numbers 16:41-50. Do you see the principles for the sermon title, Fallen Man, Just God, Wonderful Savior? Isaiah 30:18, Ezekiel 33:11, Romans 3:23, 6:23, 8:33-34, I Corinthians 15:55, Hebrews 2:14, 7:25, II Peter 3:9
